Members Trip to Wisley

Twenty-five members and their friends came on our trip to the RHS gardens at Wisley. We could offer this free trip as affiliate members of the RHS. It was a lovely day for both young and old: the younger members were able to enjoy outdoor play areas, tree climbing and the Lego Safari animals; and whilst the older members were also welcome to participate in these, there was also access to the extensive grounds, glass houses and of course to the tea rooms.



Dots and Crosses



Several people have raised questions about the dots and crosses on many of the trees in our park. Unfortunately, are they are not a fun trail to follow, nor are they Valentine's kisses left on the trees. They were placed on diseased, dying or dead trees, during recent tree surveys. They mark trees which need to be felled or trimmed to minimise risk to the general public. The dots indicate branches to be safely removed (rather than being left to fall naturally, but possibly dangerously, in the future). The crosses indicate that the tree needs to be felled. The highest risk trees have already been felled with Priority 2 being addressed now. Priority 3 and 4 will be addressed later. Whilst it is disappointing to see so many trees marked with crosses, this work is necessary to protect park users. To try and minimise the immediate environmental impact, we have asked Fleet Town Council to try and ensure that trees are "totem poled" where possible. This means that

the top and branches are removed, reducing the risk and danger to the public, but leaving some standing wood as habitat for bugs and for birds like woodpeckers, tree creepers and nut hatches. We will investigate if there is a way to utilise cut wood to improve facilities in the park. And in the longer term, we'll see if a programme of replanting is required (rather than waiting for natural regeneration).

Pool Creation on Basingbourne Heath

Basingbourne Park's Heathlands have been designated as a SINC, due to some rare wetland species which reside here. Unfortunately, increasing drainage in the surrounding area have caused a reduction in the number of these plants and some species seem to have disappeared.

To try and reverse this decline and to encourage greater biodiversity, the Friends of Basingbourne Park have undertaken some dam building and pool creation. The new pools (created in 2016) proved to be a massive boon for the local wildlife. Within months, they were packed with water weed, newts, damselfly & dragonfly larvae and many other water creatures. However, the pools still largely dry out in the summer months and their location meant that they were often in shade. To address this, FoBP has undertaken further work recently (Jan/Feb 2019):

- Cutting down birch and willow on adjoining heath (reducing shade and water absorption)
- Improved the existing dams to increase the water retention
- Enlarged the existing ditch pools, increasing the surface area receiving sunlight and overall water volume
- Created an extra dam (creating an additional new pool in an area susceptible to drying out)

Going forwards, FoBP will continue to maintain the dams, expand the pools and encourage water retention within the heathland area. Increased water retention will encourage the growth of sphagnum mosses, which in turn act as a sponge to

further help capture and retain more water and slows its release into drainage networks (reducing the risk of flooding).
