> The field slopes down to a small bridge over the stream where the main path crosses into the woods and runs along beside the stream in both directions. Standing on this slope, bat sounds started to emerge with greater frequency. The Dabentum makes a machine-gun style sound and we witnessed several flying down the pathway some 8-10 feet in the air, conducting some amazing aerobatics. his was joined by Serotines, and a Pippistrelle (the most common).

One member commented that it "was amazing to get an early warning that the bat was coming by the detector, then to see it as well was the icing on the cake". We stayed there for some 40 minutes watching the fantastic aerial display being given by the bats.

We are now looking at ways to get our own bat detectors in order to do more bat walks.
